- In northern Kentucky, southeast Kenton County
- ¹/₂ mile south of Morning View P.O. @ Rich Rd (KY-14)

Wetlands Trail - abt 0.3 miles - NO trail markers

- connects parking lot to constructed wetlands and bat habitats
- a flat mowed path thru tall grass starts behind barn's right
- leads to the rear trailhead of Dickerson Trail

Dickerson Trail - abt 0.6 miles - RED markers

- front trailhead near parking lot starts front-left of the barn
- rear trailhead in the back corner of Wetlands Trail
- a mostly wooded path with some nice ridgetop vistas
- passes both trailheads of Kreissl Trail: one low, one high
- about 175' elevation gain from parking lot to highest point

Kreissl Trail - abt 0.6 miles - WHITE markers

- 2 trailheads accessible from Dickerson Trail: one low, one high
- some nice valley, stream and ridgetop vistas
- connects to new Trail-In-Progress (Green)
- about 175' elevation gain from low trailhead to highest point
- trail created and maintained by Sierra Club's NKY Group

New Trail I.P. - GREEN & ORANGE markers

- only 1 trailhead so far, midway along Kreissl
- crosses the creek then climbs into the southern ridges
- ridgetop views of the valley, railroad track & Licking River
- trail being blazed by Sierra Club's NKY Group

The Preserve

Most of the preserve's land was once owned by German immigrants, the Steinhauser family, who settled in Kenton County in 1858. The land remained in the family through 6 generations. In 2010 the Kenton County Conservation District was awarded a grant from the Kentucky Heritage Land Conservation Fund to purchase from willing sellers the preserve's current 204 acres of fields and forests, plus more than 3,600' of Licking River frontage. The property has 5 ridgetop sites with unique views from elevations of 800'-850' of fields 150'-200' below, the banks of the Licking River 300'-350' below and ridges on other properties in the distance.

Hilly Dirt Trails In Woods, Through Valleys & Over Ridges

- Mostly easy-to-moderate hiking difficulty
- 175' or more ascents and descents on Dickerson and Kreissl Trails
- Footing can be tricky & slippery on wet soil, mud, rocks or leaves
- Spotty cell service in valleys
- Temporary markers along trails are small plastic flags or strips tied to trees. No markers on Wetlands Trail
- No restrooms
