Directions

Traveling east on the Mountain Parkway, take exit 33 at Slade. Turn left and then right onto KY 15. Travel east 7 miles to KY 715 on the left. Turn left onto 715 and continue 2.1 miles to Chimney Top Road (Forest Road 10) on the left. Follow Chimney Top Road 4 miles to its end.

From exit 40. head west on KY 15 and turn right on KY 715. Continue 2.1 miles to Chimney Top Road on the left. Follow Chimney Top Road 4 miles to its end.



Open Dates

Trails are open all year.



Trail Fees None.



Permit

You must buy a permit if camping in the Red River Gorge between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.

These trails do not meet accessibility standards for persons with disabilities.



Trails are closed to motorized vehicles.



Consumption of alcohol and open containers of alcohol are prohibited.



Camping and firebuilding in rock shelters is prohibited.



Climbing or rappelling within 300 feet of Sky Bridge, Grays Arch, Nada Tunnel or Chimney Top Rock overlook is prohibited.









Camp 300 feet AWAY from any road or trail.

Chimney Top Trail #235

Chimney Top Trail #235 passes through pine-hardwood forest to a breathtaking overlook on Chimney Top Rock. The Red River flows in the gorge below the overlook. Half Moon Rock is nearby to the left. Trail is paved to first overlook.


Princess Arch Trail #233

This trail extends out on a dry wooded ridge to a slender and graceful 32-foot long Princess Arch. The trail passes through mixed pine/hardwood stands and rhododendron.

Storing Your Food and Trash in Bear Country

Food and trash storage is mandatory, to reduce odors that attract bears. Unless cooking or eating, store your food inside a hardtop vehicle, the trunk of a car or a bear-resistant container. When camping in the backcountry hang your food at least 10 feet off the ground and four feet away from a tree.
